## Alec: No time for 'First Time'

NO, **Alec Baldwin** won't be doing any promotion for "Mini's First Time" — but he denies it's because his lawyers feel his comments on it might make his custody battle with ex-wife **Kim Basinger** even worse.

In the picture, opening Friday, Baldwin plays the husband of pill-popping alcoholic **Carrie-Anne Moss** and the stepfather of sexy **Nikki Reed**, 18, who plots with him to kill her mother. (It also features **Luke Wilson**, **Rick Fox** and **Jeff Goldblum**.) Baldwin and Reed have a sex scene in a shower that will make any parent cringe.

But Baldwin says the picture's dark subject matter, which could possibly raise comparisons to his own marriage, had nothing

to do with his decision against giving interviews for the film.

"I can't get out to do p.r. for all the films I do," Baldwin told Page Six's **Sarah Polonsky**. "You have to decide which [films] you would like to step up for and, unfortunately, I didn't have the time for this one. I've been in five movies in the past 18 months, so it's hard to be everywhere."

Baldwin stated flatly: "If I had a problem with the content, I wouldn't do the movie."

A movie industry insider had told us, "Had he [Baldwin] promoted it, it may have had Golden Globe written all over it."

But given the ongoing court battles with Basinger over visitation rights with their daughter, **Ireland**, 10, "lawyers for Baldwin

feel that during this time it may be in his best interest not to promote a film of this nature," said our insider.

Basinger, 52, and Baldwin, 48, were married for seven years before they separated in December 2000. The divorce became final a year later and they've squabbled bitterly ever since.

In May, Baldwin was forced to go back to court, where he was granted three extra days to visit with Ireland that he'd missed when she was ill earlier in the year.

Baldwin is also under contract to write a book, "A Promise to Ourselves," about the inequality men face in family court, with advice on how to get a fair shake from the judge. But Basinger has sued to stop him from penning the tome.
